23. Bring out the epic dimensions of War and Peace.
24. Comment on Dante's Construction of Hell in Divine Comedy.
25. Critically examine the significance of the endings of Kafka's novels.

Indian Writing in English and Indian Literature in English Translation

21. 'The post - independence Indian English poets evolved their own poetics'. Examine.
22. Bring out the significance of locale in the fiction of R.K. Narayan.
23. How do Mahesh Dattani's plays reflect his social concerns?
24. 'Train to Pakistan fictionalises history'. Discuss.
25. Examine the role of translation in the emergence of Indian literatures in English.

Elective - IV

American and other Non-British English Literatures

21. Examine the eclectic nature of Emerson's transcendentalism.
22. Critically comment on the representations of race and identity in Afro - American poetry.
23. Discuss multiculturalism as reflected in contemporary Canadian fiction.
24. Account for the anti - colonial nature of African writing.
25. Consider the major concerns of Australian women poets.

Literary Theory and Criticism

25. Account for the broadening of literary studies and its merger with cultural studies.
