Solutions

1. C

Explanation: Greek architect and town planner Constantinos Doxiadis coined "Ecumenopolis" in 1967 to conceptualize a future where urban areas form a continuous global city.

Explanation: Ebenezer Howard's "Three Magnets" diagram illustrated the Town (opportunities/crowding), the Country (nature/lack of society), and the Town-Country (Garden City) combining the best of both.

4. A

Explanation: Spanish urban planner Arturo Soria y Mata proposed the Linear City in the late 19th century, advocating for urban growth along a central transit spine to ensure all residents had access to nature and transport.

5. B

Explanation: A population pyramid is a back-to-back bar graph that shows the distribution of a population across different age cohorts and genders, useful for analyzing demographic trends.
